Academic information

Academic entry requirements

To apply to the Study Abroad Programme you must:

- Be studying at a university and transferring the credit you receive here back to your home institution.
- Be studying in 2nd year of university or above if planning to study in College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences
- Have achieved a GPA of 3.0 or over on a 4.0 scale or equivalent (B average)

Credit system

Under the semester system the majority of our courses will be 20 credit (Semester) or 40 credit (Year) courses. Students are expected to take the normal academic load of 60 credits per semester.

Students are not permitted to take more than 60 credits per semester and cannot normally take less credits: www.ed.ac.uk/study-abroad/courses-credits/creditsgrading-transcripts



Academic information

Courses with high demand

The below courses are high-demand, with many qualified students seeking entry to a limited number of places:

- Art and Design elective courses
- English Literature*
- History
- History of Art
- Philosophy
- Politics & International Relations

You will find that courses in the above subject areas are popular, in particular third year (honours) courses, therefore please be aware that if you need these classes to meet your degree requirements, we cannot guarantee places on these courses.

*There is a lot of competition for the available places in English Literature honours courses so we recommend that you consider our first and second year English Literature courses - which students have, in the past, found to be interesting and sufficiently academically rigorous.

The below courses are also rarely available to Study Abroad students:

- Education
- Law
- Nursing
- Sport

Making changes to your course list

Transcripts

An academic transcript will normally be issued by the end of the following February (for semester one students) and by the end of the following August (for semester two and full-year students). One hard copy transcript will be automatically sent to your home university address you give us in your application.

Application process

To apply you will create an online account with us.

Please read the application guide which will take you through the online application step-by-step: www.ed.ac.uk/study-abroad/how-to-apply

You will get a username and a password, which will allow you to track your application through its various stages.

You will need to upload copies of an official transcript, an academic reference and a personal statement.

* If you are from a U21 university then you do not need to submit an academic reference.

Application deadlines

It is important that you apply by the deadline as we cannot accept late applications.

Applications must be submitted by the following deadlines:

- 31 May for all students starting in September
- 30 September for students starting the Parliamentary programme in January
- 31 October for students starting the Study Abroad programme in January

Late applications will not be considered.

If English is not your first language you must provide evidence of your written and spoken English skills. Please refer to our English requirements:

Tests & certificates

Your English language certificate must be no more than two years old at the beginning of your course here.

If you have taken or plan to take an English language test that does not appear on our list, please contact us to check if we will accept it.

In-session language assistance

A range of academic language skills tuition, intensive credit courses and independent study materials are open to exchange students who require English language support whilst studying for their degree.

If you are coming to the UK to study for more than 6 months, you should apply for a Tier 4 General visa in your home country before travelling:

If you are studying here for less than 6 months and you do not wish to work, extend your studies in the UK or bring dependents, then you can apply to come to the UK as a short term student.

Nationals of some countries can travel to the UK for up to six months without needing to apply for a visa before travelling. These are called 'non-visa nationals'. If you are a non-visa national, you can ask for permission to be admitted to the UK when you arrive at immigration control.

If you are planning to apply for the short-term student visa upon arrival at the UK port, you must **not** travel via the Republic of Ireland.



Living costs (Basic living costs based on 2015/16 prices)

For each month students are resident in Edinburgh they should allow themselves the following sums of money to cover their expenses in the academic session.

Estimated monthly costs

	Lower range	Upper range
Rent	£360	£700
Food	£140	£250
Gas/electricity*	£40	£80
Internet	£20	£60
Mobile phone	£10	£50
Laundry/toiletries	£10	£40
Printing, stationery, photocopying, text books	£25	£50
Total per month	£605	£1,230

*Most University accommodation includes gas and electricity costs.

These costs do not include tuition fees.

Further expenses

Study Abroad students who are here for only one semester and who stay in private (non-University) accommodation may be required to pay Council Tax. Information about Council Tax is available from The Advice Place:

Travel

Most students live near the University and can easily walk to classes. If students find accommodation further away from the university, but still within the city boundary, they may need to budget for bus travel, around £45 for a 4-week travel card.

Accommodation

Students should submit their accommodation application on-line: www.ed.ac.uk/study-abroad/help-for-you/ accommodation

Study Abroad students are guaranteed accommodation, providing their application is submitted in good time. The final deadline for receipt of accommodation applications for September starts is 16 August and 16 November for January starts. Please note that we cannot guarantee that you will be offered the accommodation you ask for.

Health & personal insurance

If you are coming to the UK for more than 6 months then you will need to pay an immigration health surcharge when making your visa application. This charge will allow you equal access to the National Health Service (NHS). You may have to pay for dentistry and some more specialised services on the NHS. More information on the health surcharge can be found here: www.ed.ac.uk/international-office/immigration/new-students/health-surcharge

We recommend that short term students get normal travel insurance that includes medical insurance. While students will usually receive NHS treatment free of charge, you may be asked to pay for certain medical appointments and medication, therefore we would usually advise for students to purchase insurance.

You should register with a Doctor soon after your arrival in case you need medical advice/treatment whilst you are here.

Students should also ensure that they take out adequate insurance protection to cover personal items, such as baggage, books, personal computers etc. Insurance is included in the rent for students who are in university accommodation.
